## Message from the Country Director



January marks many things. In the Gregorian calendar, we begin our year 2009. It's the year of the Ox in the Chinese calendar (beginning January 26), the year 5769 in the Hebrew Calendar, the year 1430 in the Hijiri (Islamic) calendar, and the Buddhist year is 2553 or 2552 depending upon when you start counting. More interestingly for Americans, this January, 2009 we will celebrate the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. on January 19 and on January 20 we will observe the inauguration of the first African American President of the United States. This coincidental juxtaposition should not be dismissed. It may actually mean something.

Time moves along as it will, as we humans strive to put order in our world, food in our bowls, dignity in our endeavors and meaning in our existence. Sometimes the great events of our time catch us in their wake and gather us toward a belief that we are part of a purposeful and progressive future spiraling ever up, driven by evolution or ascension. Yet we can witness horrible atrocities perpetrated in the name of protection or service, but more often control, that give each of us a shiver of awareness, the fearful knowledge that we are all of one and the same species with shared instincts as base as they are profound. Our common humanity is more complex than summation of our empathy, our compassion, our capacity for love and for revenge, our

Why would I speak to you, brave volunteers, of such abstract and difficult thoughts? The United States of America is about to inaugurate a President who has the ability and the support to unite and to illuminate our shared humanity around the world. Whatever you may think politically, this is a moment in the progress of humankind that must happen if there is ever to be a future without war, without starvation, without hatred. I speak also in these abstract terms so you may consider what you have in common with the people in the Basotho communities where you serve: so that you will look at what unites you with them; so that you may explore what you have in common rather than focus on how you are different.

If this message seems self-indulgent and not relevant to you, then you have my apologies. But some times the rant of Don Quixote has just as much impact as the practical advice of a coach.

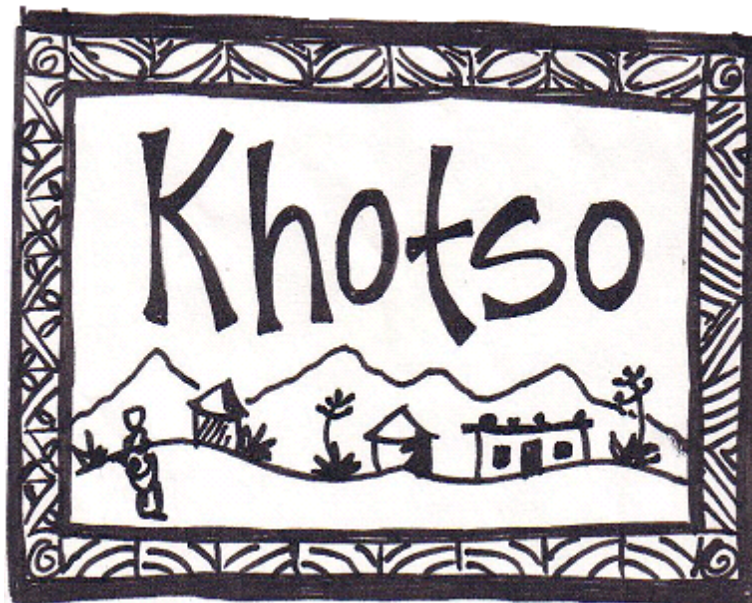

What Women Should Know Before They Get a Pap and HPV Test

Genital human papillomavirus (HPV) is a very common virus in men and women. It is passed on through genital contact, most often during vaginal and anal sex.

Most sexually active people will get HPV at some time in their lives, though most will never know it because HPV usually has no signs or symptoms. There are about 40 types of

genital HPV. In most cases, HPV goes away within two years, without causing any health problems. It is thought that the immune system fights off HPV infection naturally.

But sometimes, HPV doesn't go away within two years. Certain HPV types can linger on a woman's cervix and cause cell changes. These changes can lead to cervical cancer over time, if left untreated.

You can prevent cervical cancer by getting regular Pap tests and following up as recommended by your health care provider. The Pap test can find cell changes (caused by HPV) on your cervix. That way, cell changes can be treated before

they turn into cancer.

In the states your health care provider may use a new HPV test with the Pap test. The HPV test can find out if you have the types of HPV that are linked to cervical cancer. This test can help your HCP decide how soon you should be screened again, and what if any other tests you need. Take charge of your health by getting screened for cervical cancer, making sure you get your test results and medical care if recommended.

## AFRICAN LIBRARY PROJECT

Congratulations to all African Library Project library applicants. Below is a list of libraries that have a partner. There are currently three libraries that have yet to be partnered, but we're still hoping they will get partnered. We have 49 libraries approved so far this year.

We are hoping to conduct libraries visits before the books arrive to talk to your library committee, and conduct library workshops after the books arrive. So, we need to set up two library visits over the next year. We will also be working with libraries that received books in previous years. So, Education 09 be ready for library visits as well.

Remember that the goal is to create sustainable libraries. So, working with the school or community to get them involved and taking responsibility for the library is crucial to the success of the libraries. ### New Source for Library Books/Information on Obtaining Sara Comic Books

When I was in Maseru a few weeks ago I went to the Primary Education Inspectorate to talk to a woman about getting a set of Sara comic books. I had gone to UNICEF and talked with a woman there who said that they gave their comic books to the Inspectorate to distribute. The woman I talked to said that they had shipped most of their comic books to Ministries of Education in each district. From there the books are supposed to be given out to schools, but I don't think that there is a system in place for assuring that the books are distributed. So if anyone is looking for some of the Sara comics, you could try the ministry in your district to see if they have some.

Also, this woman told me that they regularly get book donations from overseas. They are, from what she said, general story books, science books, basically whatever people want to send. They have a warehouse room where they keep them before distributing them to the districts. The woman said that she would be interested in coordinating with volunteers to get the books out to students in the district. This would help ensure that the books actually make it out to the schools, and that they are being properly used instead of being locked away. She is more interested in donating books to school libraries but said she would be willing to give books to community libraries as well. Also, she works with primary schools only, but is contacting her counterpart who works with secondary schools to get him involved. If anyone is interested in receiving books to supplement books from the African Library Project or a library that's already established, text me your name and site (59093454). My contact at the inspectorate asked me to make a list of interested volunteers so that she could start getting books together. This is a new idea and I'm not sure how many books I can get, but it might depend on the number of interested people. This also might be a quicker way to get some books than the African Library Project. Right now I'm trying to get this up and running, so give me your info and I'll do what I can to get this new contact functional.

### Peace Corps Director Tschetter Visits Volunteers and Attends the International Volunteer Co-operating Organizations (IVCO) Conference in Cambodia

Director visits one of the newer Peace Corps countries and delivers remarks on volunteerism

Siem Reap, Cambodia, November 25, 2008 - Peace Corps Director Ronald A. Tschetter visited Cambodia for the first time since the swearing-in of the initial Peace Corps/Cambodia Volunteers in April 2007.

Director Tschetter traveled with Peace Corps/Cambodia Director Jon Darrah to visit with Peace Corps Volunteers, staff, and local counterparts. A strong supporter of the Peace Corps, U.S. Ambassador to Cambodia Carol Rodley joined the group to tour a High School where Volunteers teach English.

Director Tschetter said in Cambodia, "Our program here is thriving. Cambodia is a fascinating country with such a rich culture, and both the people and the government are great partners. During my site visits I saw our Volunteers at work within your communities. Peace Corps Volunteers who serve in this country are unique in that they teach in a Cambodian school and live with a Cambodian family. They learn the language and culture firsthand. When they return to America, they become Cambodia's ambassadors to the American people."

Currently, there are 57 Peace Corps Volunteers serving in Cambodia. The program promotes the Teaching of English as a Foreign Language (TEFL) and is geared toward classroom teaching of English at the upper secondary school level and at regional teacher training centers.

Volunteers also support local English teachers and trainers through co-teaching to improve their English language and teaching skills. Many Volunteers collaborate with their communities through developing sustainable community activities such as building biogas digesters, raising silk worms, and carrying out sports activities.

Also during this visit, Director Tschetter attended the annual International Volunteer Co-operating Organizations (IVCO) conference entitled, "Local Perspectives Informing Good Practice." The group represents heads of agencies from a number of organizations around the world that send volunteers abroad. Director Tschetter discussed a new initiative at the Peace Corps to promote volunteerism.

In his remarks Director Tschetter said, "I know our organizations share common goals. We desire for people around the world to be empowered to live better lives and transform their own communities. Together we can have great impact through supporting service and service learning around the globe."

### Peace Corps Director Tschetter Visits the Kingdom of Thailand

Visit highlights long partnership between Royal Thai Government and Peace Corps

Bangkok, Thailand, November 24, 2008 - Peace Corps Director Ronald A. Tschetter visited Thailand for the first time as Director, emphasizing the 47-year partnership between the Royal Thai Government and United States Peace Corps.

Upon arrival Director Tschetter met with U.S. Ambassador Eric G. John and Deputy Chief of Mission James F. Entwistle, along with the Deputy Director General of the Thailand International Development Cooperation Agency.

Director Tschetter (Returned Peace Corps Volunteer, India 1966-68) and Country Director John Williams (Returned Peace Corps Volunteer, Thailand 1965-67) traveled to Kanchanaburi and Chiangmai provinces to meet current Peace Corps/Thailand Volunteers and their Thai counterparts, and attended the monthly luncheon hosted by a large group of former Peace Corps/Thailand Volunteers.

During his meeting with Mr. Apinan Phatarathiyanon, Deputy Director General of the Thailand International Development Cooperation Agency, Director Tschetter said, "Thailand is one of only three countries in the entire world where Peace Corps has had continual service since its founding in 1961. We cherish our relationship with the government and people of Thailand, a true 47-year partnership in every way."

In return, General Phatarathiyanon said, "We have a long and honored history with Peace Corps. I

tell your Volunteers, you are American Ambassadors while here and once you return, you become Thai Ambassadors. Volunteers convey your unique culture and at the same time we learn so much from each other."

Currently, there are 96 Peace Corps Volunteers serving in Thailand. The first group of Volunteers arrived to Thailand in January 1962. Nearly 4,900 Peace Corps Volunteers have served in Thailand in sectors such as English education, health, water and sanitation, malaria eradication, agriculture, fisheries, the environment, and rural community development. Other projects include silk-weaving projects, community forest projects, HIV/AIDS education, teacher training, women's training, and local income-generating projects.

#### **Peace Corps Warns Public about Bogus Internet Dog and Animal Scams**

WASHINGTON, D.C., November 24, 200 - The Peace Corps' Office of Inspector General (OIG) is warning the American public to be vigilant against internet scams involving pet adoptions from Africa by a person or persons claiming to be affiliated with the agency.

"Since February of 2007, we are aware of seven U.S. citizens who have been victims of a pet scam," said Peace Corps Inspector General Kathy Buller. "We want to let the public know they should be careful in responding to ads for pet adoptions overseas, especially if the ads claim some type of Peace Corps affiliation."

One victim responded to an Internet ad about a Yorkshire Terrier puppy allegedly being given away by a Peace Corps Volunteer in Cameroon. The victim made a wire transfer to acquire the puppy before realizing something was potentially wrong. Earlier this month, the OIG received notification of an internet scam for an English bull dog also located in Cameroon.

U.S. citizens are cautioned against responding to these ads even if the person claims an affiliation with the Peace Corps. If responding to ads, look at the description, which many times is written in broken English. .

The application requires that you describe your project, its beneficiaries, a **detailed** estimate of the cost of materials and the intended follow-up actions.

If your application is approved you will receive a check and be **required** to return receipts, any left-over money, 2 photos, and a thank you note that will be sent to FOL in the states. These thank you notes are a way of ensuring continuing funding and are required. Place receipts and thank you notes in committee box and place digital photos in the VAC folder under FOL Grant Photos. Completed forms should be sent to Peace Corps office addressed to FOL, given to a VAC member, put in the committee box in the IRC, or brought to the quarterly VAC meeting.
